





## QUESTION 2 (Start on a new page.)

Block  $\mathbf{P}$ , of unknown mass, is placed on a rough horizontal surface. It is connected to a second block of mass 3 kg, by a light inextensible string passing over a light, frictionless pulley, as shown below.




Initially the system of masses is held stationary with the 3 kg block, 0,5 m above the ground. When the system is released the 3 kg block moves vertically downwards and strikes the ground after 3 s. Ignore the effects of air resistance.

When the ball strikes the ground it is in contact with the ground for 0,2 s and then bounces vertically upwards, reaching a maximum height at point **B**.



It passes point **P** at the bottom of the incline and collides with a stationary 2 kg trolley at point **B**. Refer to the diagram below. Ignore air resistance and rotational effects.



4.1 Use the principle of conservation of mechanical energy to calculate the speed of the 1,5 kg trolley at point **P**.







A group of students investigates the relationship between the work function of different metals and the maximum kinetic energy of the ejected electrons when the metals are irradiated with light of suitable frequency.

During the investigation ultraviolet rays of wavelength  $2 \times 10^{-8}$  m are allowed to fall on different metal plates. The corresponding maximum kinetic energies of ejected electrons are measured.
