TEXT A

SISTERS FIGHTING WASTE

- The idea to reduce plastic waste came about for sisters Kedibone and Kekeletso Tsiloane, after they started a construction business in 2013. They realised that one of their biggest expenses was for bricks. In an attempt to significantly reduce those costs, they went out looking for cheaper bricks, but were unsuccessful. 'This fuelled our interest to start our own brick 5 manufacturing business where we could collect, crush and melt the raw materials to produce the bricks we required,' Kedibone says.
- She explains that the company started by manually manufacturing cement bricks at home. They sold their product mainly to households and local hardware stores in limited quantities. However, they realised that they were 10 not fighting the waste battle, but contributing to it.
- Their ultimate goal was to manufacture a brick that was different, innovative and environmentally friendly. 'We did a lot of research and found that most of the bricks in South Africa are from a few suppliers who dominate the market. We identified an opportunity to enter this market by creating a role for 15 ourselves to differentiate us from the competition,' says Kekeletso.
- With the aim of reducing plastic waste, the sisters successfully started their PlastiBrick company. This is an innovation that uses recycled plastic to manufacture bricks, which are strong, durable, fire-resistant and environmentally friendly.
- The bricks manufactured by PlastiBrick are made up of various plastics collected from landfills, households and waste pickers. The production process consists of collecting and sorting different types of plastic. It is then crushed, melted, mixed with sand and moulded using brand-named essences and left to cool for 45 minutes, as opposed to the seven days for 25 conventional bricks. No water or cement is used to manufacture the bricks. The plastic, together with the sand, ensures that the bricks bond together.
- These bricks have been tested by SANS (SysAdmin, Audit, Network and Security), an accredited independent laboratory. The findings were that these bricks are stronger and less absorbent than cement bricks. They are also 30 particularly good at insulating noise and are thinner and lighter than traditional bricks.
- PlastiBrick has been recognised recently by the department in charge of housing (Department of Human Settlements) as an alternative building technology for proper houses that are durable and cost-effective.

The sisters are able to price their bricks significantly lower than conventional cement bricks, as they use far less energy to manufacture. Their bricks have also been purchased by local contractors. They have also donated the bricks to a small-scale farmer who experiences flooding when it rains. The farmer said that since using these environmentally-friendly bricks, he has not experienced any flooding.

The response to the bricks has been amazing, although some people do not take them seriously and question whether they will be able to deliver.

However, the sisters believe that with the growth of plastic use and an emphasis on eco-friendly and alternative building solutions, there is 45 going to be a drastic shift in trust between consumers and product

manufacturers. These two sisters are definitely contributing to reducing



BALANCING THE POWER SCALES

Load-shedding, power cuts, rolling blackouts; call it what you will, it is a reality.

Plainly put, power cuts are a form of short-term pain that needs to be endured. Eskom has provided some ways in which to help prepare in the event of load-shedding.

Purchase equipment that uses solar power as an alternative source of energy. Get solar lamps to put outside in the garden, solar cellphone chargers or install a solar geyser.

Gas stoves are becoming a popular choice to cook food or boil water. Empty plastic bottles filled with water and placed in the deep freezer can be used later to keep food cold in the fridge.

Battery-operated lanterns and torches are less dangerous than using just candles. You can use a head torch so that you can walk around the house easily.

A generator is often the more expensive option, but getting one may be a good idea. Electric surges are one of the biggest causes of damage to equipment during a power outage. Installing a surge protection device can help minimise damage.

So, the next time you are hit by a rolling blackout, it is well to remember that there are alternatives and to make sure you are prepared.






