INSTRUCTIONS TO MARKERS

1. Candidates are required to answer ALL the questions.
2. This memorandum serves as a guide to markers. Some responses may require a marker's discretion.
3. Candidates' responses should be assessed as objectively as possible.

MARKING THE COMPREHENSION

- Because the focus is on understanding, incorrect spelling and language errors in responses should not be penalised unless such errors change the meaning/understanding. (Errors must still be indicated.)
- If a candidate uses words from a language other than the one being examined, disregard those words, and if the answer still makes sense, do not penalise. However, if a word from another language is used in a text and required in an answer, this will be acceptable.
- For **open-ended questions**, no marks should be awarded for YES/NO or I AGREE/I DISAGREE. The reason/substantiation/motivation is what should be considered.
- When one-word answers are required and the candidate gives a whole sentence, mark correct **provided that** the correct word is underlined/highlighted.
- When two/three facts/points are required and a range is given, mark **only** the first two/three.
- Accept dialectical variations.
- For multiple-choice questions, accept BOTH the letter corresponding with the correct answer AND/OR the answer written out in full.
- If a quote is fully correct but the candidate has omitted the quotation marks, do not penalise.

YES. The more we read, the more we understand ourselves and others and we gain academic knowledge. Short messages and social media posts do not encourage deep reflection and communication is limited.

OR

NO. The literature at school level is not relevant to teenagers today. It is much easier to send a short message to a friend or to read a quick thought/post on the internet.

NOTE: Accept other suitable answers. A candidate can score 1 mark for an answer that is not well-substantiated. Accept a combination answer. (2)

- 1.9 The title is suitable as the passage explains how literature helps improve language skills, encourages empathy, builds cultural awareness, and develops critical thinking—all of which show the true value of using literature in English education.

OR

The title is not suitable as the focus of the passage is on how literature affects people in general, not only limited to an education environment. (2)

- 1.10 Traffic violations are the second-highest ✓ cause of crashes and contributed to 908 ✓ car crashes in 2024. (2)

- 1.11 Distraction of driver ✓ is the highest with a total of 3115 ✓ crashes reported. (2)

- 1.12 Open-ended.

YES. The image of the cars colliding provides a clear, visual representation of the consequences being discussed. It helps viewers quickly understand the seriousness of the topic, even before reading the details.

OR

NO. The image is small and cartoon-like, and also occupies the small part of the visual. This may undermine the seriousness of the data. An informative paragraph would have been more suitable to make the .

NOTE: Accept other suitable answers. A candidate can score 1 mark for an answer that is not well-substantiated. Accept a combination answer. (2)

MARKING THE SUMMARY

The summary should be marked as follows:

- **Mark allocation:**
 - 7 marks for 7 points (1 mark per main point)
 - 3 marks for language
 - Total marks: 10
- **Distribution of language marks when candidate has not quoted verbatim (word for word):**
 - 1 to 3 points correct: award 1 mark
 - 4 to 5 points correct: award 2 marks
 - 6 to 7 points correct: award 3 marks
- **Distribution of language marks when candidate has quoted verbatim:**
 - 6 to 7 quotes: award no language mark
 - 4 to 5 quotes: award a maximum of 1 language mark
 - 2 to 3 quotes: award a maximum of 2 language marks

NOTE:

- **Word count:**
 - Markers are required to verify the number of words used.
 - Do not deduct any marks if the candidate fails to indicate the number of words used or if the number of words used is indicated incorrectly.
 - If the word limit is exceeded, read up to the last sentence above the stipulated upper limit and ignore the rest of the summary.
