

TEXT C

The limitations of relying on ChatGPT

ChatGPT is an AI (artificial intelligence) chatbot. It is designed in such a way that the model can respond to queries and everyday questions

Excessive reliance on it can hinder academic growth. It provides instant answers, which may discourage learners from developing independent critical thinking skills. Information provided by ChatGPT can seem plausible, but it lacks insight and may not be necessarily accurate. It can be difficult to detect exactly which portions of the information are factually inaccurate.

Keep in mind that the content often lacks originality and personal voice. In English, teachers reward unique interpretations, yet ChatGPT's responses can be generic, preventing learners to expressing their own insights. A human educator can understand the emotions of students and respond accordingly. It is not the case with virtual chatbots like ChatGPT, which lack Emotional Intelligence and thus are unable to comprehend human emotions.

Al chatbots are trained on a massive dataset. If the dataset contains biases, chances are that some of the responses produced by ChatGPT will be biased. Though ChatGPT is trained with a lot of information, there's still some information it cannot access. Due to this, it may not be able to provide good answers about specific topics. It may also not be aware of the recent developments in different fields.

Relying on AI to write your assignments, will also increase the risk of plagiarism. ChatGPT can be a useful tool for guidance, but learners must engage actively with their work to ensure meaningful learning.


