PAKISTAN COURT SENTENCED CHRISTIAN MAN TO DEATH

Multan, Pakistan – A court in Pakistan sentenced a Christian man to death for sharing what it said was hateful content against Muslims on social media, after one of the worst mob attacks on Christians in the eastern Punjab Province last year.

In August 2023, a group of Muslim men burned dozens of homes and churches in the city of Jaranwal after some residents claimed they saw two Christian men tearing out pages from Islam's holy book, the Qur'an, throwing them on the ground and writing insulting remarks on other pages, authorities said. The two men were later arrested.

Ehsan Shan was accused of reposting the defaced pages of the Qur'an on his *Tik Tok* account. His lawyer Khurram Shahzad told Associated Press that on Monday, he would appeal against the death sentence issued on Saturday by a court in the city of Sahiwal in the Punjab Province.

QUESTION 4

CENTRAL AFRICAN REPUBLIC CONFLICT

The Central African Republic (CAR) was thrown into turmoil when mainly Muslim Seleka* rebels launched attacks a year ago and forced President Francois Bozize to flee in March 2013. A transitional government has since been entrusted with restoring peace and paving the way for democratic elections, but armed conflict between ex-Seleka and Christian anti-Balaka** militia have escalated significantly in the past months.

'Killings in Bangui (the capital) and in the rest of the country continue every day, and the population remains divided along religious affiliation,' Secretary-General for Political Affairs, Jeffrey Feltman, told the Security Council in a briefing on the impoverished nation, where thousands of people are estimated to have been killed. Nearly 1 million have been driven from their homes, and 2,2 million, about half the population, need humanitarian aid.

'As a result of its predominantly Muslim composition, Seleka abuses against the Christian populations in the CAR were quickly interpreted as a religious conflict pitting Muslim against Christian,' he added. On the other hand, the frustration of Muslim communities in the CAR is the result of years of marginalisation by successive governments since the country's independence 50 years ago. For instance, while the Muslim community represent an estimated 20 per cent of the total population of the CAR, no Muslim holidays are observed officially by the country.

Mr Feltman praised the quick deployment of African Union (AU) and French forces which prevented the situation from degenerating to greater conflict and atrocities***. The United Nations (UN) is currently working with the AU on organising a conference in Addis Ababa on 1 February 2023 to help the AU force to reach its authorised strength of 6 800.

*Seleka is a group of primarily Muslim rebels that previously fought against the government in Bangui.

**anti-Balaka is an alliance of militia groups composed primarily of Christians.

***atrocities are cruel acts involving physical violence or injury.
