- 1.1.4 Explain why the USSR was against the rebuilding of Germany. (1 x 2) (2)
- 1.1.5 Why do you think Stalin saw the introduction of Marshall Aid as an attempt to undermine Russian influence in eastern Europe? (2 x 2) (4)

- 1.2.1 Why, according to the source, was the USSR obliged to implement new measures? (1 x 2) (2)
- 1.2.2 How, according to the source, did USSR control the movement of train commuters between the Soviet zone and the Western zones? (1 x 2) (2)
